Computerised

systems can manipulate large amounts of information and generate a wide range of information products. They offer speed, diversity, flexibility and a rich and comprehensive documentation of process, and it is no wonder that they have been so quickly embraced around the world as a critical information management and com-

munication tool. Electronic records means information which is generated electronically and stored by means of computer technology. The information can exist either in structured applications, which hold transactional records (i.e. Persal, Logis etc) or in unstructured application (i.e electronic records generated on individual PC. and in E-mail systems. Three properties are necessary to ensure the maintenance of the essential characteristics of a

record, namely content, structure and context. Records which are created by using the hardware and software technologies of today should remain available, usable, understandable and authentic over a long period of time. Electronic records need to be migrated to new hardware and software platforms constantly to enable them to remain accessible. Migration strategies have to be planned for during the design phase of the electronic records system. This should be carried out without the loss of any information. To be continued.

In retrospect.

The 2008 hyperinflation was a good year for an archivist, unfortunately a lot of events passed by without any documentation at NAZ. I remember about 16 people being ferried in a single trip in a Mazda B1800 truck from town to workplace and vice versa because there was no sufficient fuel to run many errands. I remember Mugove requesting to be put in the Guinness Book of Records for being the first female Orderly to work consistently for such tiresome tasks. I remember one morning, Munhu waMwari, Chitsike high up on a dry tree top chopping fire wood. Whether it was for domestic use or for sell I do not know. Seeing Mdhara Kashiri splintering logs was a pathetic sight. This was made worse by stories of people cooking sadza as early as 9am so that they would have the energy to walk to town, and wander from one bank to the other looking for money. I remember Mutimhodyo eating unroasted nuts straight from the pockets of his jacket drinking with a cup of black tea. It was a common thing to dismiss researchers by 3pm and lock offices because Desk Duty Officer was told that there was no fuel to ferry staff to town, one had to use public transport or walk (with the latter being the most likely). This was often fused with sentiments such as "Saka ndiani oudza Jonso?" (Who then can tell Mr Johnstone that we are closing now?).

In memory of the year 2008 I say lala nokuthula, R.I.P, it is now your 5th Anniversary. Vouchers brought some smiles on the faces of government workers because it was now the era of multicurrencies. People will remember civil servants singing and twisting Sulu's song "Zvatinoita kwedu tinobheja mavoucher tichifadza vagona". Subsequent resignations by senior staff members were however uncalled for. It resulted in provincial staff members being summoned to come and fill in these vacant positions. It's unfortunate that just a single year seem not to have been enough for one dear brother who had promised to leave no stone unturned in making things straight - he found greener pasture and bid farewell.

Money lubricates things. A staff bus was purchased after a former librarian bellowed in a meeting with the Director that rain had pounced on them on their way to town. In his own words he said, "Ha shefu takanaiwa, ende takanaiwa zvechokwadi, dai matiitirawo bhazi" (Sir we were pounced by rain, truly we were soaked, it is better that you purchase a staff bus for us). Even svikiro (spirit medium) at Chibondo confessed that he too wanted the T&S. With economic stabilization, staff members have unconsciously engaged in dressing competitions. I am pleased to take it from the notebook that NAZ staff members are making strides in advancing their education for whatever reasons whether by choice or default. It's pleasing to see 90% of the lowest ranks now possessing National Certificates despite the employer having frozen transfers and promotions – what a pity.
